I have had a life long interest in art. In college I took many studio classes and was considering a career as an art teacher; however, life took me down a different path, and I am a Montessori teacher in Buffalo.

My interest in art was developed at home from my mother's example and from many artistic family members. My mother and aunt gathered together every Tuesday to paint. After my children came along, I brought them to the paint sessions. Hopefully, one day my children will discover their own passion for painting. My aunt, who lived in Nashville, was a pastel artist. When I graduated from high school, I spent time with her in the summer at her home. She had a beautiful studio and wonderful zest for life. That summer had a profound effect on me, yet I did not realize until much later in life my own passion for pastel painting. About four years ago I inherited her drafting table, which I am honored to use now.

I am drawn to painting landscapes in my garden or at area nature preserves. Nature is deeply inspiring to me. I enjoy plein air painting during my summer breaks; however, I mainly work in my studio, an attic bedroom. It was actually a plein air outing at Forest Lawn about three years ago that sparked my passion for pastels. I took my four pastels that I had left over from college days along with a drawing pad, and I painted the Three Graces Water Fountain in Mirror Lake.

There are several resources I use, including my iPhone. I take photos of everything that catches my eye. I also look in art books or if I am interested in an artist, I go to the website. I like a variety of pastel brands, including Rembrandt for the first layers. I also have many Sennelier and Schmincke. I really love Diane Townsend terraces and of course Terry Ludwig. Mount Vision has its place in my palette tool. I really like using pastelmat, then I reach for part 400. I have been using a la carte lately too. I have heaps of Canson Mi Teintes, which are not my favorite, but I use them to make studies.

Some of my favorite works are from when I head out to a nature preserve. Reinstein Woods has beautiful waterlilies that I find inspiring. Another memorable location is a park near where I grew up; I did a painting of my daughter and me as we looked out over the lake in that park.

The most rewarding aspect of being a pastelist is how it has helped me to do some inner work after experiencing trauma. I love the solitude and thoughtful time spent at the easel as I try to figure out a painting. The process sends me into a zone that is refreshing, inspiring and restorative. I come away happy, usually. Sometime I do get frustrated because I haven't been successful with the end product, but the time spent creating is usually really great!

The following are some challenges I encounter when trying to solve some of the problems each painting offers: how to create what I see in my head, how I want to translate the inspiration from a photo, what I want to say with each piece. I strive for a

gestural, loose style, and yet, I get hung up on the small details. It is hard. Sometimes I do okay; other times, I don't.





Drawing Autumn Scenes using Pastel Pencils

As we approach the upcoming Autumn months, I thought I would touch upon Autumn colors and how to achieve the warm tones in the leaves. My painting, Walk in the Autumn Mist, is a great example of all the colors I use for an Autumn scene. In pictures like this, ivory and grey are effective base colors. In the Faber-Castell Pitt Pastel Pencil range, I recommend 103 for your Ivory and 270 for grey. These are great base colors to start with. If you are doing a picture that has lighter golden colors, the ivory is ideal because that makes the yellows and the oranges that you are going to put on top register better. When I want to achieve stronger colors like dark brown and rich ochres, then grey is a better base color. If I use grey for the yellow and orange colors, they look weaker. When I put the richer colors straight on without the grey base, they appear too strong. By putting the grey on (No. 270 in the Faber range), it pulls the color back a bit, and when those other colors go on, they are tempered. When I am painting something like chestnuts, I use a very rich burnt Sienna (No. 283 in Faber-Castell-s range). So for this I recommend putting down the grey I mentioned previously, 270. You put the white on the shiny parts of the chestnut and then the grey around it. There are parts of a chestnut that are really dark, almost to the point of being black, so for this, I use a medium tone grey like 273. Then I put darker colors on top of this - 168 or 187. After that, to bring the warmth in, I add orange (109) and then graduate through to 283 then 177 and black. I refer to the numbers of the pencils because then there is no confusion with the exact colors. Using the term "grey" could mean any sort of grey. As you can see, achieving these darker tones requires a more advanced understanding of the base colors going on underneath. To get black in pastel pencils doesn't just mean putting on black. There are a number of colors that need to go on first, especially if you want a warmer or cooler tone to black. 
