

### MEET OUR MEMBERS: Neal Allen

Though I have been a member of the Pastel Society of Western New York for only a month, I have been interested in art ever since I can remember. Growing

up in a large family, on a small income, we often entertained ourselves with our own creations. When I was ten, I temporarily lost my hearing due to a childhood illness; thus, when the books were all read, I turned to drawing, copying pictures from books and comics, which helped to improve my skills. While in his teens, and 20's, my brother experimented with art. I was always taken by a child drawing that he created. I made some chalk drawings for my son when he was very young, and by chance, I took a pastel class. Since then I have taken a few workshops and had some mentoring sessions with Michael Chesley Johnson. He is an amazing person that has helped me immensely.

I consider myself a landscape painter, and I particularly like to be by the water, anywhere, but I do quite a few still life and animal portraits as well. I have a studio set up in the downstairs of my home. Before I retired, I spent years collecting odds and ends so that when I did retire, I could come as close as possible to to the ideal set up; however, there is always something on my "need" list! I frequently post my work on Wet Canvas. This pastel forum is not nearly as active as it used to be, but the pastel group moderator is very nice and extremely helpful. I have taken a few Zoom critique sessions since the pandemic began and again, I can't say enough about how helpful Michael Chesley Johnson has been. I have a few favorite pieces that I have created; most are landscapes of my favorite places. I painted a barn I used


to drive by on my way to church every Sunday, and not long after I completed the painting, the barn was torn down; thus, it is a great keepsake of a happy memory. I also have a nocturne that is my wife's favorite, and I have painted copies for our closest friends. We call it our "portal," —we can look at it and know that our friends have the same vantage point.

There are several reasons I enjoy working with Pastels. I love the immediacy of pastel, overall, but there are instances when a color lays down just right, or a tree appears from a few strokes, which really makes me smile and feel happy. As for painting supplies, I am a huge Mount Vision fan. When he was first starting out, Karl Kelly used to live about ten miles from me, and he would meet with me to discuss different colors and uses for each. I also really like Caran d'Ache pastel pencils—easy to sharpen, great colors, and they layer over just about anything. I use Art 400 almost exclusively but I also like the rough side of Canson paper, and I will use that when I want to do something quickly, or when I have sanded the tips off my fingers, which luckily, I don't do too often! Of course, the downside of pastels is dust. I do worry about breathing it in sometimes, but I have not gone the purifier route yet. I also get a little tired of trying to transport paintings without them "burping" all over mats, but I have become good at mat cleaning!

I enjoy showing my work in competitions and exhibits. In 2008 I received third place in the Master's Division of the Adirondack Art Show at the View in

Old Forge and second place in the oil/acrylic/pastel category in 2012. During April-May I was selected to have a solo show at the Fort Hill Performing Arts Center in Canandaigua. Additionally, I have been chosen for the Pastel Society of America's e-blasts on their Facebook page, most recently in the animal/wildlife e-blast. I have been juried into the Northeast National Pastel Show (no longer in operation), the Adirondack Pastel National Juried Exhibition (including this year) and the Pastel Society of New Hampshire's National Juried Show. I am a board member, exhibiting artist and workshop co-chair for the Ontario County Arts Council. I still consider myself a relative novice in the art world, having no formal training, but I am always striving to learn, improve and share.




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### Scenes from the the Botanical Gardens in South Buffalo

### **How to Paint a Pastel Seascape**

Sometimes I know just what I want to paint—other times I look through old photos or my idea board until something says "paint me!" Today I chose a photo of a local beach at low tide— I like the sense of distance and the diagonals in this photo. I know it will need something else to bring it alive, but I have an idea for that.

### **Choosing the Paper**

So I have decided which reference photo I'm going to use, and now I need to choose the color of my sanded paper. I use either Canson or Mi-Tientes sanded pastel paper because

the tooth holds layers of pastel, and I don't need to fix the finished paper. So, how do I choose one color from all the possibilities?

I take the photo and look for papers that either provide a strong contrast with the main color or temperature of the subject or one that matches the dominant color and temperature or maybe one that matches the temperature but is a darker or lighter tone than





the dominant tone of the subject. Here, I have narrowed it down to 3 colors, so I lay the photo over the intersection of the papers and see which one I think feels right. I choose the mid tone color as I think it will give a good under color showing through the pale foreground sand; it takes care of the middle ground and won't dominate the sky, which I want to stay light and bright.

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#### **Now for the Pastels**

This is when I get out my boxes of pastels and the fun starts. I decide on my Great American ArtWorks seascape set, a fantastic set of Sennelier half sticks; my "orphans" box, and couple of pastel pencils to sketch it.

### Sketching


I could transfer the image by any number of methods but I'm not too fussy about getting it exactly right, so I just sketch in the main forms of the mountains, hills, horizon, sea and sand. The one thing I am careful about is getting the horizon dead level! I use a dark pencil for the background and then a light one for the sand and sea, as I don't want the dark to show through later layers.

### Blocking in



Now I start blocking in the main shapes Mostly I use the local loosely. color (the actual color in the photo), but in the middle ground hill, I pop in some bright reds and golds. I want these to show through a little under the final greens to give some added warmth to the painting. I make sure to put in some light pinks and yellows at the base of the sky for some sparkle. The wet sand gets a swathe of dark blue as it will be useful later in establishing the dips and shadows in the sand. Once I have finished blocking in, I smooth the sky and hills with the side of my finger to blend the colors.





### The Sky and Hills


Next I work in some blues in the background hills and some greens in the middle hill. I add the suggestion of trees and some more golds into the dry paddocks. Also, I do a little work on the junction between the wet and dry sand.

#### The Sea and Sand

I add more layers of pale pinks, yellows and blues to the sky and some of the same colors in the sea. I start adding layers of creams, siennas, ochres and some purples to the wet sand and darken the edges of the sand bar. Then I add a sprinkle of washed up sea grasses to the edge of the wet sand.



Next it's a bit of a suggestion of the path and then some seaweed on the dry sand. I work up the grasses around the path using darks and then some lighter colors for the sunlit side. I use some hard conte sticks for the grasses. Notice I have darkened the water's edge some more and added a little pink to the water as well. I want to give a sense of how shallow it is here. Some shadows from the grasses help to show the slope of the path.




### Finishing Touches

I want to add a little life and movement, so I pop in a few wading birds on the wet sand. They also carry the eye from the strong sand diagonals back towards the water and hills. You can see I have strewn a few white shells and some darker marks around for a bit of added interest and texture to the sand.



Last, I add a final distant sail boat, my signature; and the painting is finished. On the whole I am quite pleased. The finished painting retains the strong compositional lines that first drew me to the subject, but I have warmed it up, strengthened the contrasts, and added some movement.


